 -Roots date before Civil War
 -1st published in 1918 in Plantation Melodies: A Collection of Modern, Popular & Old-time Negro-Songs of the Southland
- 2 My Grandfather's Clock (D) -Henry Clay Work (1876)
- 3 Bicycle Built For Two (C) (kazoos out!) -Harry Dacre (1892)
- 4 Down to the River to Pray (D) -Unknown origin

 -earliest known version of the song, "The Good Old Way,"
 was published in Slave Songs of the United States in 1867.
- 5 The Cat Came Back (Am) (Cat ears/tails out!?) -Harry S. Miller (1893)
- 6 Scarborough Fair (Am) Traditional English circa 15th century or earlier
- **7 Midnight Special (F)** -traditional folk song thought to have originated among prisoners in the South.
 - -Refers to passenger train Midnight Special
 - -1st printed lyrics in 1905 Howard Odum (later popularized by H. Ledbetter)
- 8 Ukulele (C): -adapted from Irving Berlin's "I Love a Piano" (1915)
 -From the show "Stop Look and Listen"
 -1st Performed on Christmas Day with 6 pianos
- 9 Shine On Harvest Moon (C) (kazoos out!) Nora Bayes and Jack Norworth (1908)
- 10 Worried Man Blues (D): -Traditional Folk Song (Roud Folk Song Index No. 4753)
 -passed by oral tradition (lyrics vary from version to version)
 -Recorded by many artists-Carter Family, Woody Guthrie, Johnny Cash etc.
- 11 Wayfaring Stranger (Am) (Early 19th Century)
- 12 There is a Tavern in the Town (A)
 -Words & Music by F.J. Adams (1891)
- 13 We Won't Go Home till Morning (A) -1842 (arranged by William Clifton, published by Thomas Birch)
 -tune dates to 1783 or earlier
 -Sheet music pic (1905) "Keller Mack & Frank Orth's new rollicking song hit... as sung by Bessie Wynn" who sang it as a vaudevillian actress
